Superintendent's Report

Well, the 2005-2006 school year is well under way, and everything seems to be rolling along extremely well. It takes a lot of work on a lot of levels to get a school year started successfully. I would personally like to thank the Central Lyon custodial crew for their hard work in pulling everything together in time for the start of the year. The buildings and grounds have never looked better.

On another front, the Central Lyon Foundation graciously donated \$10,000 to our school for use with technology. We utilized this money with other funds to purchase 73 new computer towers to upgrade several labs around the building. In an effort that saved approximately \$9000, we continue to use the monitors from the old computers. A key component of this project, however, was the work of our technology staff, Don Liefeld and Cindy DeWandel, in getting the computers up and running well before school started.

This year we had several staff vacancies in the teaching and extra-curricular areas. I am thankful for current staff members who "stepped up to the plate" to help us out with open duties, and I am very excited about the new staff we have hired. The new and veteran

staff members have fit nicely together and have gotten down to the work of educating our children. Recently the state of Iowa has put a greater emphasis on the new "three R's" – rigor, relevance, and relationships. As superintendent, I have the privilege of moving throughout the buildings and witnessing the interactions of our staff and students, and I can tell you that these three qualities are taking place daily here at Central Lyon!

Finally, on a business note, our enrollment is up this year. This is good news for the district as student numbers are directly tied to state funding. As superintendent, I am pleased with the state of our curriculum and the delivery of it through a quality staff; I am pleased with our facilities and grounds; and I am pleased with our extra curricular offerings. Our goal, however, must be to never become complacent with what we have. We must continue to self analyze and make improvements where they are needed. Academic Eligibility Policy

SECONDARY THOUGHTS

The high school faculty advisory committee has prepared a revised version of our current academic eligibility policy for board approval. The major change to this policy includes changing the policy to consider quarter failures only. Currently, a semester failure will ban a student from co-curricular activities for eight weeks. Under the new proposal, a student will be ineligible for four weeks following any quarter failure. In addition, May term failures will count as two weeks of ineligibility instead of the former four weeks.

The second proposal for the academic eligibility policy involves the make up of the appeals committee. Currently the policy recommends five teachers and one administrator to act on an appeal from a student. The new proposal includes two teachers, one being our activities administrator, one board member, and the high school principal. The faculty advisory committee is very favorable about this policy change and, with board approval, the new policy can be implemented immediately following the second quarter.

Upon returning to Iowa schools after being in administration for eleven years in Minnesota schools, I am often asked, "How do the two states compare in regards to their educational systems?" The bottom line for both states is the challenge

of improving student achievement. As I have learned under the new Iowa Teaching Standards, the first and perhaps most important standard of the eight required standards for teachers is the task of improving student achievement. Under

this new plan in Iowa, there are eight standards and 42 criteria that teachers are responsible for in public education. These standards include student achievement, content knowledge, planning and preparation, instructional strategies, monitoring student learning, classroom management, professional growth and professional responsibilities. In Minnesota, one of the requirements for students to graduate is to pass basic skills tests in math, reading and writing. This is one of the

key differences between the two states at this time.

As I move back to my home town and the school from which I graduated, I am so pleased to discover the level of trust our students place upon each other in the area of security. Our building has few padlocks and no security cameras, and our teachers are not identified by security badges. There is a lot to be said about Northwest Iowa's values and the trust we place in each other. Students of Central Lyon High School—keep up the good work in this area of our school environment.

Lastly, I would like to congratulate our Homecoming King and Queen, Jessa Menning and Andrew Zachow, for the honor given to them during coronation. Our week was filled with many activities, and students enjoyed participating in the dress up days as organized by our student council. Friday, we concluded the week with Homecoming Olympics. The mighty seniors were victorious over the underclassmen in all the activities. The week went very well, and students are to be commended for their fine behavior throughout the week. Teachers, now we can get back to the business of education as usual. Thanks for a great week!

No Bench, No Time-Outs

Welcome to our world of cross country. In 1990, sports sharing agreements were created between Central Lyon and George-Little Rock. One of them was cross-country. During the early 1990's we had very little participation from either school. However, as the years progressed so did the numbers and the quality of the athletes. In 1997 the combined schools' boys' team won the Siouxland conference meet, and they repeated in 2004. In the fall of 2000, Andy Rust became our first combined schools' boys' state qualifier. Amanda Folkens became our first girls' state qualifier in 2004. The 2005 team consists of 20 boys and 13 girls. The varsity boys' team has won two team titles this fall, and the girls' varsity team has one team win. All teams, varsity and JV, have shown both individual success as well as high team placings.

Unlike in most sports, the low score wins in cross country. Teams are comprised of seven runners, five counting toward team totals. Team scores are the sum of individual placings in meets with up to 75 runners in each race. The boys' race is 3.1 miles, while the girls run 2.4 miles. Weekly training miles range from 30 miles for the girls to 35 miles for the boys.

The district meet, held on October 20, qualifies ten individuals and three teams of each gender to the state meet in Fort Dodge. If you haven't been to a cross country meet, join us in Fort Dodge on October 29. Come in some sweats and running shoes and experience a sport with no bench, no time-outs, and no half time.

Financial Aid

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On Tuesday, November 1, at 7:00 pm, there will be a financial aid meeting for parents in the high school vocal music room. This meeting should be especially helpful to parents of seniors and juniors. It will be very beneficial to parents who have not been through the financial aid process before.

The meeting will focus on the financial aid process, including a detailed discussion of the FAFSA and an overview of the state and federal aid programs. It will be conducted by the College Planning Center of Des Moines. They are a division of the Iowa Student Loan Liquidity Corporation, a private, not-for-profit corporation. The center provides FREE information, assistance, counseling and support to college-bound students and their families as they plan for college and apply for financial aid. Note to Parents of Seniors

Throughout the year, the guidance office will be giving various handouts—magazines, brochures, and pamphlets—to the students, especially the juniors and seniors. Much of the information given to them will be related to post-secondary schools, financial aid, or careers. Please ask your sons/daughters on occasion if they have received any information which might be of interest to you.

Seniors have received a booklet entitled *Your Course to College*. This booklet put out by the Iowa College Student Aid Commission has a lot of valuable information. For anyone going on to some type of post-secondary school in Iowa, there will be some important information listed for several of the schools. School contact information, costs, aid filing deadlines, enrollment, minimum admission requirements, etc., can be found in *Your Course to College*.

ACT Prep Session

On Thursday, November 3, West Lyon will be hosting an *ACT for You* prep session at 7:00 pm. This session is for any high school student planning to take the ACT within the next year. Two presenters from USD will be there to share ACT test-taking information and hints, and to provide information on what to expect on each of the ACT subject area tests. The session, which is free to all participants, will last about one hour.

PLAN or SAT?


Several students indicated an interest in taking the PLAN or PSAT test. Each student who indicated interest was given a guide/bulletin to help him/her better understand the test and was encouraged to share this with his/her parents. Information letters were sent to the parents of these students. These tests will help give the students excellent exposure into what a college entrance test (ACT and SAT) is like.

The PLAN test was given at the high school on Saturday, October 8. The PLAN is actually a preliminary ACT, developed by the American College Testing program, who also creates the ACT.

The PSAT was given at the school on Saturday, Oct. 15. This test is a preliminary SAT developed by The College Board, who also makes the SAT. The PSAT is connected to the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, which offers scholarships to the top scoring students throughout the U.S.

This year we are pleased to announce that senior Ben Tomjack has been chosen to be a National Merit Semi-finalist and has been invited to move on for further testing in the scholarship program.


This year the featured speaker is Bruce

High Stakes Testing

Hardly a week goes by without an article in the newspaper that debates the relevance of schools and testing. Since the *No Child Left Behind* legislation was passed, student achievement has come to the forefront. Several states have adopted legislation that requires students to pass state-required exit exams in order to be promoted to the next grade. Fortunately, Iowa hasn't resorted to that tactic. Each school district in Iowa still has what we refer to as local control. This means that individual school districts can set their own policies in regards to promotion, retention, etc. Students at Central Lyon do not have to pass a state-required exam to be advanced to the next grade.

During the last week of October, students in grades two through eight will be taking the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills. This is the only standardized test that our students are required to take. When we get the results back, we will be able to compare the scores of our students on both the state and national levels. I'm asked quite often why we have to do this.

Test taking tips:

1. Get good night's sleep.
2. Eat a good breakfast the morning of the test(s).
3. Arrive at school on time.
4. Avoid scheduling appointments, etc.
5. Avoid absences, if possible.

The answer is simple. It is the one requirement from the state of Iowa. All students who attend public school in Iowa have to take a test that compares them to their peers on both the state and national levels. The state has set a proficiency average that each school district must obtain in the areas of math, reading, and science. If your school district falls below the average in any of these areas, you are put on the watch list. I won't go into details but, as you can imagine, that is not a place we want to be. The Iowa Tests of Basic Skills are important to our school system. We want our students to do their best. Do we consider the tests "high stakes"? Absolutely not. They are part of the process. Our students have a history of doing well on these tests. I don't expect that to change any time in the immediate or extended future.

Bands Combine for Annual Massed Band Show

On Friday night, September 23, the Central Lyon and George-Little Rock bands met on Dick Null Field for the annual massed band football show. Approximately 250 students from both schools took part in the show.

The show featured the combined high school bands opening with "Diablo Canyon." The Central Lyon Middle School Band then entered the field, playing "Louie, Louie." Next was the George-Little Rock Middle School Band, playing "The Hey Song." Then, both middle school bands went into formation on the field as the high school bands played "On Broadway." The combined high school and middle school bands then played "Goldfinger and James Bond Theme." Finally, the Central Lyon fifth grade band entered the field, and everybody performed school songs from both schools.
