#### New Preschool in 2008-2009

During the 2007 Iowa State Legislative session, funding for four-year-old preschool programs through the local school districts was approved. The approval came in the form of grants which will be funded by the state as the program is phased in over the next four years. The first year for the grants was this current school year, and several neighboring districts were selected through the grant process in the first round. Central Lyon did not apply in the first year in order to facilitate the preparation and planning process. Central Lyon will be applying for the grant this year and in the next consecutive years until the grant is awarded to 115.

Many factors are taken into consideration in the selection process including cooperation with local agencies, poverty level of the district, and the

status of current preschool programs in the community. The Central Lyon school board has approved beginning a four year old preschool program for the 2008-2009 school year regardless of a grant award from the state. Students enrolled will need to pay only the standard registration fees. This program will fall under the guidelines established by the state of Iowa for quality preschools. The curriculum will be sequenced to blend into the current transitional kindergarten and kindergarten programs.

While this is an exciting opportunity for the patrons of Central Lyon, many questions about the new program are likely to surface as we move forward. It must be perfectly clear that <u>four year old preschool is not mandatory</u>. <u>Parents do not have to send their students</u> if they so choose. Because this is a voluntary program, the school district will not be transporting the students. Interested parents will need to make transportation arrangements for their child to and from school. Because state statute does not allow for students under the age of five to be transported by bus, this will not be an option.

The program must be staffed by a certified teacher with an early childhood endorsement. A ratio of one staff member to every ten students must be maintained; therefore, a paraprofessional will also be staffed in the classroom. If you wish to enroll your student for the program, the child

student for the program, the child must be four years of age by September 15. Students will need to be current with immunizations to enroll.

While we are currently in the planning stages, the current plan is to hold both a morning session and an afternoon session. The half day program will be held four days a week, Monday through Thursday. This allows the program to meet the state guidelines of a minimum of ten hours of instruction time per week. Students will not be eating lunch at school, but snacks will be provided.

We wish to emphasize that this preschool program is for four-year-olds only. Transitional kindergarten is offered for students who are five on or before September 15. Transitional kindergarten is a two full days per week program.

Central Lyon will begin enrollment for the 2008-2009 program on February 25, 2008. If you wish to enroll your student or have questions about the program, please call the elementary office at 472-4041.

## FFA "Food" Sales By Dwayne Postma, FFA Advisor

Another very successful year of fruit sales was recently completed by the Central Lyon FFA. We refer to our project as fruit sales, but we should refer to them as food sales because of the wide selection of food products sold. Each year the agricultural business class manages the sales as though they were the class's very own business. This group utilizes business concepts such as profit margins, wholesales vs. retail pricing, warehouse storage, proper sales presentation, recordkeeping, and accountability. Along with the entire FFA membership, this class learns a great deal through out "food" sales activities.

Just to give you some idea of the magnitude of our sales, we compiled a little inventory. We sold over 200 boxes of apples, 175 boxes of grapefruit, 250 boxes of oranges, 150 boxes of pears, 350 boxes of clementines, and 125 boxes of potatoes. Keep in mind each box weighs between 25-50 pounds! Along with the fruit, we also sold 3600 pounds of peanuts, over 3500 pounds of cheese and cheese products, over 1500 butter braids and pastry puffins, over 1200 pounds of beef and beef sausage, 225 gallons of apple cider, and, yes, even 300 pounds of pickled herring, among other things. It is very important to note that not only do the "food" sales act as a great learning exercise, they also provide our FFA chapter with a profitable fundraiser. We'd like to thank all of you for your support.

### **Crisis Planning**

ust about every school year, we hear the horrific stories of school shootings and unthinkable school violence in the United States. After each of these incidents, the concern is raised about whether or not schools are prepared for these emergency situations. At Central Lyon, we have crisis plans in place for many difficult situations and circumstances. We hold fire and severe weather/ tornado drills regularly, but most recently we have begun concentrating on serious threat crisis planning to include dangerous intruder, gunman, gas leak, or bomb threat.

Each of these scenarios may require a different decision to be made, but know that we have worked closely with the local sheriff's department to establish our procedures. Our planning may not cover all possible scenarios, but we have been diligent in our pursuit of uniform procedures which govern our actions which are based on expert professional recommendations. Local law enforcement has reviewed and even practiced maneuvers within the school building to become familiar with our school.

In the case of a gas leak or bomb threat, immediate evacuation of the building will take place. The district will

respond to all immediate threats such as these, but will also work closely with law enforcement to investigate all threats.

In the scenario of a dangerous person or gunman in the building, a lockdown of all classrooms will occur. All district staff have been informed of the procedures, which include moving students away from windows and doors, locking all entrances,

and hanging signs in classroom windows to indicate the situation within the room to law enforcement officials. As a lockdown occurs, a central command post will be established between administration and law enforcement, and all roads to the school will be blocked. A SWAT team from the sheriff's office will enter the building, attempting to locate the dangerous person or persons. A second sweep team of deputies will then enter the building and evacuate students and staff after all areas of the building are approved for evacuation by the SWAT team.

During an evacuation or after release by the sweep team, students and staff will move quickly to the evacuation centers which have been previously established. The elementary and middle school will evacuate across the street to Holy Name Catholic Church. The high school will evacuate to the Central Lyon Activities Center (Old Gym). The district has established a reunification plan for both centers to assist in reunifying parents and students after an incident. Parents should be prepared to receive directions from school personnel who are responsible for the reunification. We have a well-ordered and organized method established. We ask parent cooperation as it may be chaotic, and it will be important to account for everybody to ensure each student's safe return.

It seems unfortunate that we should have to concentrate so much energy on this type of school safety when we should be concentrating on student learning. Unfortunately, in these times it is necessary. Please be assured that we do have these crisis plans in place, obviously in much more detailed fashion, just in case we ever need them. Let's just hope we never do.

Our D.E.A.R. (Drop Everything And Read) program is currently in the second year of use in the high school. Students and staff read silently for 14 minutes daily. Research shows that silent sustained reading programs benefit both students' reading skills and their appreciation of reading.

### PLAN & PSAT Tests

Back in October, 26 sophomores took the PLAN test, and 20 juniors took the PSAT test. The PLAN is a preliminary ACT test that gives students an excellent idea of what the actual ACT is all about. The PSAT is a preliminary SAT and also a beginning point for the National Merit Scholarship Program.

#### **Financial Aid**

For the fifth consecutive year, the College Planning Center in West Des Moines assisted Central Lyon families with filing the FAFSA online. Several families of senior students planning to

attend post-secondary education utilized this free service on February 4.

Now available from the guidance office is the paper application of the 2008-2009 FAFSA. (Earlier I had announced that I would not be able to get these, but I was able to obtain several copies.) For those who will file the FAFSA online, there is a new 2008-2009 FAFSA ON THE WEB WORKSHEET. Both of these may be obtained from the guidance office.

## ACT Notes

Juniors interested in taking the ACT test during the 2007-2008 school year were given registration materials during the fall semester. They were encouraged to take the test either April 12 or June 14. Several have chosen to take it earlier as a "practice run." If your student is planning to take the test in April or June, mail the material or apply online by the early registration deadline or there will be a \$19 late registration fee added to the \$30 basic fee. Please keep in mind that there is a big push for students to register online—online registration will have a faster turn around time in processing the application.

The ACT is generally used by four year colleges and some nursing schools as part of their entrance requirements. Students who plan to attend a vocational/technical program or specialty school usually will not be required to take the ACT. Please call or email me if you have any questions concerning the ACT test.

- SNOWCAP: Sign up at www.snowcaponline.net to receive a text message or e-mail alerts. **Alltel customers:** Prior to signing up for snowcap, upgrade your software on your cell phone by following these steps on your cell phone: type \*228 then hit send, listen to prompts. At completion of upgrade, you will hear whether the software upgrade was successful or not. If it is successful, you will need to type \*78 and hit send. If the \*228 upgrade is unsuccessful, you can take your phone to your local store, and they will help you with the upgrade.

When your upgrade is complete, sign up at www.snowcaponline. net. You will receive a text message from snowcap asking you to confirm by replying with the code sent to you. Once these steps are completed, you are ready to receive Snowcap notifications.

When a decision to start classes two hours late is announced, continue to monitor the radio/TV stations. The decision to cancel school will be made by 9:00 a.m. if weather/road conditions do not improve. In the event of an early dismissal, the radio/TV stations will be contacted at least one hour prior to the closing.

## **Technology in the Classroom**

With all the technology in today's world, it is continually more difficult to keep students motivated in the classroom. Using the traditional paper and pencil lecture format in classrooms is still useful and has its place, but students seem to like varied delivery methods from teachers. Scientific probes and graphing calculators, WebQuests, Power Point Presentations, and WISE Projects are just a few of the ways technology is being brought in today's middle school science classroom.

The eighth grade earth science students are presently finishing up the second quarter of the school year by completing a Power Point presentation on a volcano of their choice. Within their oral presentation, the students are required to use the Power Point software and the skills they have learned in the technology education classroom to complete a presentation of at least three minutes in length. This is an end of the unit project geared to show me what the students have learned through our study of volcanoes. Information about tectonic plate boundaries, different types of volcanoes and magma, subduction zones, composition of rocks are a few of the required pieces of information in

the presentation. To further enhance the presentation, the students are downloading videos and animations into their presentations to keep the other students interested in their report. As a teacher, I am amazed at what my students are able to produce using the computer. I am continually trying to find more and more ways to get technology into my classroom.

WebQuests and WISE Projects are ways in which technology is part of my classroom as well. These "Quests" and projects are found on-line. These websites and projects are provided through two universities, the University of California at Berkeley and San Diego State University. These website have hundreds of different projects based on themes such as cell division, thermodynamics, and the possible causes of global warming. Within these projects, the students may need to research certain questions to fully explain their answers. These projects help engage the students by making them express their opinion on certain topics and backing their opinion with facts from an expert in the field. The biggest asset to presenting the information in my curriculum in this way is that it makes the students think for themselves. Students are asked to do such things as writing a persuasive letter to a politician expressing the reasons for industrial change to limit possible ozone depletion leading to global warming. These projects are self contained. All questions and supporting information are at the students' fingertips. This helps to keep the students focused on the task at hand, and does not allow them to "surf" other websites on the World Wide Web.

Technology is available for teachers and students to take advantage of. I see technology as a big asset due to how it helps supplement and connect the textbook information with other technology resources. Technology has become a big part of my current curriculum. With the possibly of gaining access to a "SMART" board, I see my curriculum becoming more and more integrated with technology in the years to come.

## Mock Trial By Terry Van Berkum, Mock Trial Advisor

I has been 18 years since the middle school mock trial program began here at Central Lyon. The mock trial program has grown from one middle school team (10 members) back in 1990 to two middle school teams and four high school teams (roughly 55 students) today. The 1990 team qualified its first time out of the blocks with the famous Lupohound case. This case consisted of roughly twenty pages of witness statements and two exhibits. Today's cases usually run eighty pages of statements and ten exhibits, along with explanation of Iowa law. Central Lyon mock trial has produced many state participants as well as some all-state witnesses and all-state attorneys. The 1996 middle school team, which placed in the top four, was beaten by the eventual state champion by one point.

This year the high school teams will consist of four teams one for each grade level 9-12—a first for Central Lyon. Each year the cases vary. This year the case for both levels deals with criminal. Next year the cases will be civil and the subject material varies. Cases have dealt with drunk driving, murder, AIDS, steroids, and wrongful death. This year the middle school's case dealt with a murder after a sporting event, and the high school's case will deal with assault and burglary.

Finally, the year 2008 has Iowa mock trial celebrating its 25th

anniversary. The state began the recognition of this event during the middle school state competition. A chair was designed for John Wheeler who is the state coordinator and national president for the mock trial program. John has been with the program for roughly 23 years. The chair was designed and painted by a former Central Lyon mock trial participant, Nick Van Berkum.




## **Healthy Snack Activities**








Fourth grade students enjoy an apple snack.
